


In 2017-18 21 volunteers contributed **2,800 hours** in the areas of strategy, policy, research, IT, events, legal, administration and volunteer support. Using the ‘Benefits Calculator for Organisations’ and taking into account volunteer expenses, we estimate a conservative value of volunteers’ contribution to be worth over **\$221,000**. 

How technology has changed!

In 1988, prospective volunteers read about volunteering positions in newspaper articles or heard about them via word of mouth. Volunteer records were kept manually and typed on a typewriter. By 1992, technological resources consisted of four computers, two printers and a photocopier.

Years later in 1999, VIKTOR was born, a database that allowed organisations to post opportunities onto the internet. VIKTOR is used by over 6,000 organisations.

As needs and technology have continually evolved over the last thirty years, our systems and processes have been updated and enhanced to make posting and finding volunteer positions as seamless for our users as possible.

Today, all volunteers in Western Australia are invited to attend the ceremony which takes place in the Government House gardens but in the event's earlier days, invitations were only open to people nominated by the public and by Members of State Parliament.

Tina Siver was the first paid employee when she was appointed Director, assisted by volunteer Sheila Weigand who remained with the centre for many years.

A board of management was set up with Robyn Barrow as interim Chairperson followed by Jan Knight as inaugural Chairperson. In July 1990 when Tina resigned, Sallie Davies stepped across from the Board to fill in until a new Director was appointed. She eventually became the first Executive Director.

Today, Volunteering WA has 21 paid employees and 30 volunteers working across Western Australia in partnership with over 700 members. We manage seven volunteer hubs and partners with 23 Volunteer Resource Centres.




Tim Prail

Revenue




DURING THE YEAR VOLUNTEERING WA RETURNED A NET SURPLUS OF \$14,894 COMPARED TO \$123,766 THE PREVIOUS YEAR. MUCH OF 2016/17 SURPLUS REVENUE WAS DUE TO A GRANT WHICH WAS EXPENDED ON CAPITAL EQUIPMENT.

Although our overall revenue is slightly less than last year, tight control of budgets and spending have maintained a good result for the year end.

The accompanying diagram illustrates our efforts to diversify our income streams with 50% of revenue coming from government grants, 19% through our corporate partnerships, followed by 13% representing our events and sponsorships revenue.

The Expenditure diagram shows that the majority of our total expenditure is Employee Expenses (ie salaries and on costs). Volunteering WA is fortunate to have a talented team of people experienced in the volunteer sector and it is this experience which assists greatly in undertaking our various projects and events on time and within budget.

Statement of financial position

The accompanying Statement of Financial Position shows Volunteering WA to be in a strong financial position with Net Assets of \$1,075,978 compared to \$1,061,084 last year. We have adequate cash reserves to manage current and future projects. Our budget for the 2018-2019 financial year forecasts a surplus and therefore we expect our financial position to continue to remain strong. Other than normal trade creditors and provisions, Volunteering WA remains debt free. A full copy of the financial report is available at volunteeringwa.org.au.

For the last five years I've been volunteering for Volunteering WA, most recently with the Marketing and Communications team. What makes me come in every week? I love giving back to the community. 

Volunteering WA builds stronger sustainable communities, by providing leadership and support to volunteer-involving organisations throughout the State. Thanks to the support and valuable feedback from our members, we are able to address the challenges and opportunities within the sector and work collaboratively to build volunteer capacity in our communities and achieve our mission of **leading, advancing and celebrating volunteering in WA.**

Volunteering WA was proud to represent **706 members and affiliates** in 2017-18.

Our annual member survey helps us to understand our members' needs and priorities to ensure we provide the services, advocacy and support that is relevant and most beneficial to our member organisations and groups.

The biggest challenges member organisations face:

- Not enough staff to carry out work supporting volunteers
- Constant turnover of volunteers

The services most valued by individual volunteer managers:

- Access to VIKTOR, the online volunteer recruitment and referral database
- Training

The services most valued by volunteer organisations:

- Promotion of good practice through National Standards
- Promotion of research into volunteering-related issues

Volunteer Support Services (VSS).

Volunteering WA manages seven external volunteer hubs which make up the Volunteer Support Services Team. The hubs support volunteers and volunteer-involving organisations by providing volunteer matching services, best practice advice in volunteering and individualised support to volunteers and volunteer managers.

We have five regional and metro hubs that operate with

federal funding provided by the Department of Social Services, in partnership with local organisations. The Joondalup Volunteer Resource Centre is run in partnership with the City of Joondalup while the UWA Guild Hub is run in partnership with the University of Western Australia Guild. Our VSS team bring location-based services and great value to the communities they serve with a special emphasis on assisting those experiencing disadvantage.

Connecting people through technology.

VIKTOR is the national volunteering database developed by Volunteering WA. It continues to grow and connect people to their communities by providing organisations and Volunteer Resource Centres across Australia with the technology to reach out to volunteers.

This year over **75** volunteer resource centres and **5,773** community organisations have used VIKTOR to list volunteer positions with **8,000** active volunteer roles listed through VIKTOR at any time.

VIKTOR allows organisations to post opportunities to the SEEK Volunteer and GoVolunteer websites, as well as a number of other websites. This year **606,239** volunteers have visited GoVolunteer (a 4% increase) resulting in **32,628** expressions of interest being delivered through the website.

VIRA is Volunteering WA's easy-to-use volunteer management system. Built by volunteer co-ordinators, for volunteer co-ordinators, VIRA simplifies and streamlines every facet of volunteer management. VIRA talks to both VIKTOR and the Volunteer Profile to reduce duplication and data entry, and was recently promoted at the national volunteering conference. VIRA is constantly being updated and has had several upgrades this year, including volunteer and position tagging capabilities as well as improved reports and exports.

THE VOLUNTEER PROFILE CONTINUES TO BE A GREAT SUCCESS ACROSS AUSTRALIA WITH 13,861 VOLUNTEERS CREATING THEIR PROFILE THIS YEAR, BRINGING THE TOTAL TO 58,742.


The Volunteer Profile gives volunteers the ability to record their own volunteer experience, receive recommended opportunities to their personal device and search and shortlist opportunities.

The GoVolunteer App also continues to connect volunteers to opportunities with 1,639 volunteers downloading the app this year, bringing the total to 6,991.

Volunteering WA provides daily helpdesk support to VIKTOR, VIRA, GoVolunteer, SEEK Volunteer, Volunteer Profile and GoVolunteer App users across Australia. The helpdesk continues to provide a high level of customer service and this year has responded to a total of 1,176 telephone calls, 6,015 emails and 2,053 support ticket requests.




International Volunteer Day.

Engaging with the Volunteering Sector in 2017/18



The Committee supports the publication of a Research Digest twice a year, comprising new and recent research within the sector. This is available on the Volunteering WA website.



Dr Megan Paull participated in panel sessions, and Professor Kirsten Holmes, and Dr Djurre Holtrop, also from WA, presented their research to practitioners from all over Australia at the Volunteering Australia National Conference in June 2018.



In June 2018, Dr Megan Paull presented a workshop to the Volunteer Managers Network on the subject of valuing volunteer managers and how they can advocate for their role and the sector as a whole.



During the year, the Committee established the WA Researchers Network to bring together researchers interested in volunteering as a subject of research. The network held its first event in February 2018 and discussed ideas for enhancing the accessibility and practical impact of academic research and issues volunteer-involving organisations face.



In December 2017 Dr Kirsten Holmes, together with a research team from across Australia and overseas, presented a workshop to volunteer managers to promote the findings and recommendations from the final stage of their research into good practice in Recruiting and Retaining Volunteers.

Training

Volunteering WA is committed to delivering high-quality training for volunteers and volunteer managers. Gilda Davies, Volunteering WA's Training and Development Manager, is continually improving and developing new training to address the changing needs of the sector.

In 2017/18 Volunteering WA continued its program which offers three levels of professional endorsement ranging from Administrator, Coordinator and Manager. The Sector Leader (Master) will be developed in 2019.

These endorsements provide professional recognition for those who manage volunteers. Achievements are recognised with a certificate at each level of attainment, providing a measurable standard for volunteer management in WA.

THE PROFESSIONALISATION OF VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT HAS BEEN ONE OF OUR TOP PRIORITIES THIS YEAR AND THIS IS REFLECTED THROUGH THE QUALITY OF OUR VOLUNTEER MANAGER TRAINING AND THE SATISFACTION RATING OF 97.4%.

Leadership

Volunteering WA strongly believes that leadership is about imparting knowledge to those who can lead others.

With our large and diverse membership base, our training programs are tailored to suit those that are new to volunteer management through to those who have a few years’ experience. By providing valuable leadership training, we help build and strengthen the knowledge and capacity of the volunteering sector.

Volunteer Leadership Network

The Volunteer Leadership Network (VLN) is an expanding group of senior-level volunteer managers who meet every six weeks to discuss leadership and strategic issues around volunteer management. Now in its second year the VLN continues to attract new members.

The set-up and work of the network was front-and-centre during a full 90 minute panel discussion at the National Volunteering Conference in Sydney in June 2018.

Volunteer Resource Centre Network

The Volunteer Resource Centre (VRC) Network consists of 30 centres throughout Western Australia and an additional six Community Resource Centres. The VRC network meetings are convened by Volunteering WA each quarter to discuss, and provide insight into, issues of importance within the sector.

During the year Volunteering Australia CEO Adrienne Picone, travelled to WA to meet members of the VRC in person.

Adrienne said, "One of the highlights of my first year at Volunteering Australia was getting out of the office and meeting some of the VRCs across the country. I was delighted to be invited to join the thriving VRC Network in WA, and hear firsthand about some of the challenges the sector is facing in WA. VRCs are integral to safe and effective volunteering, and ensuring that volunteering is valued and recognised."

Volunteer Manager Networking sessions provide a forum for volunteer managers to gain and share knowledge, learn from peers, and discuss industry issues.



As the peak body for volunteering in the State, Volunteering WA advocates on behalf of volunteers, Volunteer Resource Centres and volunteer-involving organisations.

This involves building and maintaining beneficial relationships with State Government and agencies to ensure engagement and adequate investment for WA's volunteering sector.

Advocating for volunteers, we provide representation and support to individuals or groups on an 'as-needed' basis, or to advocate for volunteers collectively by working with volunteer-involving organisations, government and the corporate and community sectors to provide the best environment and opportunities for volunteers.

Advocating for Volunteer Resource Centres and volunteer-involving organisations (Volunteering WA members and the broader volunteering sector), we seek to influence the environment in which these organisations operate so that they can gain the maximum benefit from the involvement of volunteers in the organisation. This may be by influencing government policy, the corporate sector, media and local community, or by promoting good practice in attracting and managing volunteers.

VOLUNTEERING WA PROVIDES A RANGE OF FACTSHEETS AND POSITION STATEMENTS TO MEMBERS, ALONG WITH THE PATHWAY TO BRING ISSUES TO THE ATTENTION OF GOVERNMENT AND INDUSTRY BODIES.

Volunteer Community Reference Group.



Tower of Strength campaign.



The 'Tower of Strength' National Volunteer Support Services Advocacy Campaign was a collaborative effort by Volunteering Australia, the State and Territory Peak bodies and federally-funded Volunteer Support Services. The successful lobbying effort involved promoting safe, effective and sustainable volunteering programs, and how their existence was dependent upon the retention of designated Federal Government funding. The campaign resulted in Volunteer Support Service (VSS) funding being retained until June 2021.

THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES HAS COMMISSIONED INDEPENDENT CONSULTANTS TO REVIEW THE VSS ROLE NATIONALLY. THESE RESULTS WILL HELP SHAPE THE FUTURE OF VSS AND DETERMINE THEIR STRUCTURE BEYOND JUNE 2021.

Volunteering Australia commissioned research into the VSS and their impact on communities. This research is available on the Volunteering Australia website.

Tertiary engagement.

Every university in Western Australia is represented on the Tertiary Community Engagement Committee, convened by Volunteering WA. The committee, which met once per quarter in 2017-18, aims to share knowledge and ideas relating to student volunteering, as well as foster good practice in volunteer management on their respective

campuses. University-based volunteer hubs are vital in providing meaningful volunteering opportunities for students as well as increased skills and community engagement experience during their tertiary education years.

Topics of interest for the Committee included: volunteer recognition, volunteer management systems, event volunteering and volunteer screening.

Once again, an inter-university planting took place at Friends of Lake Claremont during National Student Volunteer Week, showing how large challenges can be tackled when individuals come together.

Emergency management.

Volunteering WA is a member of the State Welfare Emergency Committee, in its designated role as the manager of spontaneous volunteers during an emergency.

We also sit on the Community Engagement subcommittee of the Western Australia's peak emergency management body, State Emergency Management Committee (SEMC).

WA Peaks Forum.

The Forum is an independent group of non-government human services sector peak bodies who work together to identify common policy priorities, undertake strategic planning, create joint initiatives and advocate to government for the best interests of human services, service users and the wider WA community.

Homeless Connect Perth.



Homeless Connect Perth is a one-day event based on a one-stop-shop model of immediate service provision to homeless people in our communities. It is a partnership between Volunteering WA and the City of Perth, bringing together volunteers, government organisations, business and community groups to provide a diverse range of free essential services to people experiencing or who are at risk of homelessness. This year, the event celebrated its tenth anniversary of helping those in need.







The Corporate Volunteer Council organised their first-ever joint volunteering event, where twelve senior staff members from seven of Perth's largest business came together at Bethanie West Perth Social Centre to lend a hand during morning tea and participate in games with approximately 15 social centre clients. This event was extremely successful in breaking the cycle of social isolation. Held during National Volunteer Week, it tied in well with the theme of 'Give a little, Change a lot' theme, representing the millions of volunteers who make a significant impact in their communities by giving a little of their time.

The CVC also promoted corporate volunteering by providing speakers to conferences in Western Australia. Representatives from Woodside and Bankwest spoke at the Chamber of Commerce and Industry Human Resources Conference on the Engagement Benefits of Corporate Volunteering, while Volunteering WA presented at the HBF Wellness for Business Conference on the wellness benefits of corporate volunteering.

Guild Volunteering.

Guild Volunteering is a joint venture between Volunteering WA and the University of Western Australia (UWA) Student Guild. Located at the UWA Crawley campus, Guild Volunteering aims to connect UWA students to volunteer opportunities both on campus and in the community, and to resource and facilitate a culture of student volunteering at UWA that is diverse, meaningful and inclusive.

The Numbers

Guild Volunteering listed more than **606** roles on the volunteer database, assisting over **3,142** students (a **25%** increase from last year) into volunteering who contributed approximately **58,041** volunteer hours (a **66%** increase) to the community.

Volunteer regional trips to support community groups in Albany and Margaret River were a huge success as well as a project in partnership with the Association for Survivors of Torture and Trauma (ASeTTS) to host a series of events and activities to welcome newly-arrived Syrian and Iraqi refugee children and teenagers to their community.

National Volunteer Week saw a number of events including volunteer day trips, a Q&A panel with student volunteer leaders and a Volunteer Fair which brought over 20 community partners and clubs to campus, encouraging students to come down and find a volunteer opportunity whilst also enjoying refreshments and entertainment. It was a great way of saying thank you to our current student volunteers.

National Student Volunteer Week was packed with exciting events including an inter-university planting event at Friends of Lake Claremont, volunteer day trips, micro volunteering, a Volunteer Management Networking session for student volunteer leaders and clubs and our annual Student Guild Volunteer Awards which recognised the contributions of our amazing student volunteers.
