First nations priority group

Yinggarda elder Philly Dodd volunteered to lead a project to paint the old bus stop at the back of Woolworths carpark to make it a beautiful place for people who use this space. In Yinggarda, 'nyina' means to sit down.



Philly Dodd: lead volunteer

Attracted 50+ volunteers for stencil design workshops, and the week-long painting.

Philly's project generated trust in the Hub to support First Nations volunteers, generated conversations in the community, and opened the door for first nations community members to champion their own project

















Lithium battery sculpture People living with a disability priority group

TSM (pseudonym): lead volunteer

- Attracted 10+ volunteers across education, planning and design sessions, and painting the fridge
- Led to a "part two" project, with research around lithium drop off points, poster design and street letterbox drop
 - Culminated in Thursday's 12-2pm drop-in time for "all abilities" to do one-on-one project planning for their volunteer activity

- Promoted broadly to Carnarvon residents with an "all welcome" approach. Attracted 12~ women from all priority groups.




Led to a collaborative artwork across several art sessions, with different women taking turns to lead, culminating in a statement piece around reconciliation.







